Overview

The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> (DOJ), <u>Office of Justice Programs</u> (OJP), National Institute of Justice (<u>NIJ</u>), seeking applications for funding for research designed to meet the challenges stemming from domestic terrorism. This project furthers the Department's mission by supporting the development of new knowledge and tools to address the challenges of crime and justice in the United States.

This solicitation incorporates the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide by reference. The OJP Grant Application Resource Guide provides guidance to applicants for the preparation and submission to OJP of applications for funding. If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.

Other

For purposes of this solicitation, the term "State" means any State of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virginia Islands, Guam,

American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

Foreign governments, foreign organizations, and foreign colleges and universities are not eligible to apply. Federal agencies are eligible to apply. (Any award made to a federal agency will be made as an inter-agency reimbursable agreement.)

To advance Executive Order 13929 Safe Policing for Safe Communities, the Attorney General determined that all state, local, and university or college law enforcement agencies must be certified by an approved independent credentialing body or have started the certification process to be eligible for FY 2021 DOJ discretionary grant funding. To become certified, the law enforcement agency must meet two mandatory conditions: (1) the agency's use of force policies adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws; and (2) the agency's use of force policies prohibit chokeholds except in situations where use of deadly force is allowed by law. The certification requirement also applies to law enforcement agencies receiving DOJ discretionary grant funding through a subaward. 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Program Description Overview

With this solicitation, NIJ seeks proposals for rigorous research and evaluation projects targeted toward developing a better understanding of the domestic radicalization phenomenon, and advancing evidence-based strategies for effective intervention and prevention. This includes research efforts that explore the radicalization of Americans to white nationalist extremism, and those exploring emerging militant left-wing movements, to identify and advance evidence-based strategies for effective intervention and prevention.

NIJ seeks proposals in three areas of focus:

- Research to inform terrorism prevention efforts.
- · Research on the reintegration of offenders into the community.
- Evaluations of programs and practices to prevent terrorism.

Funded projects will apply an approach that engages researchers and practitioners in an active partnership to develop more effective solutions to specific problems and to produce transportable lessons and strategies that may help other localities with similar problems.

Applications proposing research involving partnerships with criminal justice or other agencies, should include a strong letter of support, signed by an appropriate decision-making authority from each proposed, partnering agency. A letter of support should include the partnering agency's acknowledgement that de-identified data derived from, provided to, or obtained through this project will be archived by the grant recipient with the National Archive of Criminal Justice Data (NACJD) at the conclusion of the award. Applicants and their potential partners are encouraged to review the NACJD's policies and protections at (NACJD). If selected for award, grantees will be expected to have a formal agreement in place with partnering agencies by January 1, 2022. That formal agreement must include a provision to meet the data archiving requirements of the award.

In the case of partnerships that will involve the use of federal award funds by multiple partnering agencies to carry out the proposed project, only one entity/partnering agency may be the applicant (as is the case with any application submitted in response to this solicitation); any others must be proposed as subrecipients.

Statutory Authority

Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (sections 201 and 202).

Specific Information

This solicitation seeks applications for funding for research and evaluation projects that will address the knowledge gaps related to preventing radicalization to terrorism, with clear implications for criminal justice policy and practice in the United States.

Definitions and Scope: Terrorism is one form of targeted violence. For the purposes of this solicitation, "terrorism" is defined as ideologically motivated violence to further political, social, or religious goals. "Terrorists" are those individuals who commit or provide support for the commission of terrorism. "Radicalization" is defined as the process by which individuals increasingly adopt a terrorist ideology. Note: an individual may be radicalized and adopt a terrorist ideology without engaging in any acts of terrorism.

With this solicitation, NIJ invites applications for research focused specifically on terrorism. Although applicants may propose projects focused on one or more particular form of grievance or ideology, NIJ's purpose is to build knowledge about terrorism and radicalization, regardless of specific grievance or ideology. Applicants should include clearly-stated definitions of key terms and concepts, as well as descriptions and examples of how they will operationalize the radicalization- and terrorism-related phenomena that they are proposing to study. Applicants should also ensure that the findings from the proposed research (if awarded) will have the potential for high external validity beyond the focus of the study itself.

Under this solicitation, applicants will be limited to focusing on the radicalization process as it occurs in the United States, regardless of the locale of any act of terrorism that may ensue from that process. Applicants are encouraged to use comparative approaches in their applications, where warranted, and these may draw on international comparisons. However, applicants must focus their research on the radicalization process as it occurs within the United States, or terrorism prevention activities within the United States.

NIJ has funded research on terrorism and domestic radicalization since 2012. Applicants should familiarize themselves with prior NIJ-funded research and include knowledge of relevant research in their literature review. For a summary of NIJ-funded research projects on the subject of terrorism, see https://nij.gov/topics/crime/terrorism/Pages/welcome.aspx. Additionally, applicants are strongly encouraged to familiarize themselves with research projects on this issue that are funded by other federal agencies (e.g., Department of Homeland Security) and other sources within and outside of the United States.

NIJ will not fund research that solely examines the conventional political views of individuals or groups, including their participation in non-violent forms of political activism. Accordingly, grantees should clearly indicate in their proposal how they intend to delineate and study radicalism, extremist views, or other forms of illegal political activity (e.g., direct action or violent protest) separately from lawful political conduct.

Research Priorities:

NIJ is interested in receiving applications addressing the following three priority areas:

Area of Focus #1: Research to Inform Terrorism Prevention Efforts

NIJ is seeking applications that build and improve on existing national and international research in the area of terrorism prevention, including research that improves on

program development, data sources, and methods. More specifically, NIJ encourages applicants to propose novel approaches to study risk and protective factors as they relate to radicalization and terrorism within the evolving terrorist threat landscape in the United States. NIJ is particularly interested in understanding how the radicalization process is similar or different based on the types of extremist ideologies as manifested in the United States; including, but not limited to, the full spectrum of political ideologies. This also extends to an understanding of how strategies for effective intervention and prevention may vary based on the ideology.

As it regards the spectrum of political ideologies, in addition to white nationalist extremism, NIJ is interested in emerging militant left-wing movements. For example, civil unrest over the last year, particularly in major cities, has been accompanied by increasingly coordinated acts of intentional physical violence against police officers and civilians, deliberate arsons and lootings of private businesses, and the destruction or vandalism of government property.—Many of these crimes have been attributed to militant left-wing radicals (collectively referred to as "anti-fascists") that have openly advocated for violent "direct action" against the United States government. [1]

NIJ recognizes that extremists' use of online platforms can be a vital mechanism for communication and recruitment to radicalization, especially in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. While applicants may propose research to understand, prevent receptiveness, or build resistance to extremist recruitment material in both the on- and offline spaces, NIJ has serious concerns with intentionally exposing research participants to extremist materials and propaganda. NIJ will not award funding to applications that introduce, expose, or disseminate extremist materials and propaganda to study participants.

Area of Focus #2: Research on the Reintegration of Offenders to the Community

NIJ seeks applications for research related to the reintegration of offenders incarcerated for terrorism-related offenses as they return to their communities. NIJ encourages applications that build knowledge of how to effectively and efficiently support the reintegration of terrorism offenders. Specifically, NIJ seeks to build knowledge of prerelease and post-confinement characteristics of terrorism offenders that may inform reintegration policies, programs, and practices. This population is understudied. NIJ is seeking applications to conduct empirical assessments of those convicted of terrorismrelated offenses; their sentences, their risks and needs, and how they compare to others in custody or released from custody. For example, what are their risks and needs when they return to the community with regards to issues like reengaging with family, finding employment, and finding housing? Additional issues pertaining to pre-release include, but are not limited to, factors that positively or negatively influence radicalization during confinement, factors related to participation in correctional programs, and factors that influence sentencing and release. Additional post-confinement issues include, but are not limited to, life trajectories of terrorism offenders following release, recidivism within this population, services provided to them post-release, and radicalization independent of further offending.

NIJ recognizes that this priority area is seeking research on a hard-to-reach population. Applicants should demonstrate that they are well prepared to access research participants, gain and retain a sufficient sample size, access administrative data sets, and conduct research in correctional settings as necessary by including letters of support and other appropriate documentation.

Area of Focus #3: Evaluations of Programs and Practices to Prevent Terrorism

NIJ seeks proposals for either: (1) formative evaluations and evaluability assessments, or (2) outcome evaluations of terrorism prevention programs. For both options, evaluations considering a diverse array of terrorism prevention approaches will be prioritized. NIJ is particularly interested in evaluations of community-based terrorism prevention programs and evaluations of programs to reintegrate offenders that were convicted for terrorist related offenses (e.g., providing material support).

Community-based programs often include efforts to: (1) provide local law enforcement and other practitioners with appropriate professional development opportunities to prepare them to engage in terrorism prevention; (2) engage with key community members and groups to build awareness and trust; (3) improve the likelihood of reporting by community members who may see warning signs; and (4) intervene, communicate, or deliver services as appropriate to prevent and reduce the likelihood of terrorism.

NIJ is interested in the development and process evaluation of reentry programming for offenders convicted of terrorism related offenses. Programs may include new or existing rehabilitation programs in correctional settings (e.g., prison) or community-based reentry programs. These efforts should inform future research efforts for impact/outcome evaluations and replication.

Option 1: Formative Evaluations and Evaluability Assessments: NIJ recognizes that not all terrorism prevention programs may be at the stage of outcome evaluation readiness; as such, a phased approach is needed. The phased evaluation approach is a multistep process that ultimately results in a rigorous outcome evaluation. In Option 1, applicants should plan to conduct a formative evaluation, as well as, an evaluability assessment to determine whether an outcome evaluation of the program or model is possible.

If successful, awardees may be encouraged or invited to submit an application for funding of additional phases to build on its findings. The specifics of the additional phases will be dependent on the findings of the formative evaluation and evaluability assessment. Subsequent phases may include: (1) a process evaluation of the specified program(s) or model(s) or (2) an outcome/impact evaluation of specified program(s) or model(s). Future evaluation opportunities out of the phased approach may also include support for replication studies of programs or models.

Evaluation Designs should include:

- Descriptive research of terrorism prevention program(s) leading to the development of a logic model(s).
- Evaluability and research capacity assessments of programs to be studied, including but not limited to, access to data and participant recruitment, consent procedures, and agency burden.
- Development of implementation guide for specific program(s).
- Development of instruments or measures to test fidelity of program(s).

Applications should provide detailed information on how all tasks will be accomplished, include a multidisciplinary evaluation team, and demonstrate clear support from related

partners.

Option 2: Outcome Evaluation: In cases where programs have achieved a suitable level of development, NIJ encourages applicants to propose rigorous outcome evaluations, using randomized evaluation designs, where it is possible and appropriate to do so. If that is not possible or appropriate, applicants should propose the most rigorous and appropriate design to produce high-quality causal evidence.

Under this option, NIJ will only fund projects that evaluate well-developed programs. Applications should include, and append supplementary materials as necessary to describe, the level of program development. Supplementary materials may include copies or links to logic models, program guides and materials, policies and procedures, manuals, prior evaluation findings, program staffing, and funding information. Note: funding under this solicitation may only be used to cover costs associated with the evaluation, but may include reasonable costs incurred by program personnel to support activities directly and exclusively required for the execution of the evaluation (e.g., manual extraction of administrative records).

Randomized controlled trial (RCT) studies are a powerful, much needed tool for building scientific evidence about what works. Therefore, studies employing RCT methods to assess the effectiveness of programs and practices are strongly encouraged and will be given higher priority consideration. A strong RCT design should include low sample attrition, sufficient sample size, close adherence to random assignment, valid outcome measures, and statistical analyses. Taking RCT costs into consideration, applicants may want to consider studies using privacy protected administrative data that are already being collected or implementing an intervention into a program already funded.

Coordination with Existing Studies

Applicants are strongly encouraged to familiarize themselves with research projects that are addressing this issue at other federal agencies, including but not limited to: the Department of Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services, the Department of Homeland Security's Science and Technology Directorate, the National Counterterrorism Center, and the Department of Defense. NIJ will take into consideration how proposals build on existing or published research on topics described in this solicitation. NIJ will also coordinate with other federal agencies to ensure awards are not made under this solicitation for research that duplicates existing studies.

New Investigator/Early Career Opportunity

NIJ is interested in supporting researchers who are early in their careers and new to NIJ's research grant portfolios, specifically non-tenured assistant professors, or equivalent full-time staff scientist positions in a research institution. Applications that include a principal investigator (PI) who meets the criteria may, in appropriate circumstances, be given special consideration in award decisions.

At the time of application submission, the proposed PI must:

- Hold a non-tenured assistant professor appointment at an accredited institution of higher education in the United States or an equivalent full-time staff scientist position at a research institution in the United States.
- Have completed their terminal degree or post-graduate clinical training within the four (4) years prior to September 30, 2021.

 Have never previously received NIJ funding as a PI on a research project with the exception of Graduate Research Fellows or Data Resources Program grantees.

If seeking to be considered for the New Investigator/Early Career Opportunity, the applicant should identify that they are a New Investigator/Early Career proposal on the title page of the application.

Evaluation Research

If an application includes an evaluation research component (or consists entirely of evaluation research), the application is expected to propose the most rigorous evaluation design appropriate for the research questions to be addressed. If the primary purpose of the evaluation is to determine the effectiveness or impact of an intervention (e.g., program, practice, or policy), the most rigorous evaluation designs may include random selection and assignment of participants (or other appropriate units of analysis) to experimental and control conditions. In cases where randomization is not feasible, applicants should propose a strong quasi-experimental design that can address the risk of selection bias.

Randomized controlled trial (RCT) studies are a powerful, much needed tool for building scientific evidence about what works. Therefore, studies employing RCT methods to assess the effectiveness of programs and practices will be given higher priority consideration. RCT applications with strong designs measuring outcomes of self-evident policy importance are strongly encouraged. A strong RCT design should include low sample attrition, sufficient sample size, close adherence to random assignment, valid outcome measures, and statistical analyses. Taking RCT costs into consideration, applicants may want to consider studies using privacy protected administrative data that are already being collected or implementing an intervention into a program already funded.

Applications that include evaluation research should consider the feasibility of including cost/benefit analysis. In cases where evaluations find that interventions have produced the intended benefit, cost/benefit analysis provides valuable and practical information for practitioners and policymakers that aids decision-making.

Evaluation research projects may also address a wide range of research questions beyond those focused on the effectiveness or impact of an intervention. Different research designs may be more appropriate for different research questions and at different stages of program development. The intervention strategies, setting, other contextual factors, and resources should be taken into account when selecting an evaluation design. In all cases, applications are expected to propose the most rigorous evaluation design appropriate for the research questions to be addressed.

Applicants are encouraged to review evidence rating criteria at https://www.crimesolutions.gov/about_starttofinish.aspx for further information on high-quality evaluation design elements.

Goals, Objectives, Deliverables, and Timeline

Goals

The goal of this solicitation is to fund rigorous research and evaluation projects that build knowledge with practical utility for federal, State, local, and tribal criminal justice agencies and their partners engaged in terrorism prevention efforts in the United States.

Objectives

This solicitation has three primary objectives: (1) conduct research to inform terrorism prevention efforts, (2) conduct research on the reintegration of terrorism offenders to the community, and (3) evaluate programs and practices to prevent terrorism. The deliverables from this solicitation will consist of published works that speak to these objectives.

Deliverables

<u>Final Research Report.</u> Any recipient of an award under this solicitation will be expected to submit a final research report. Additional information on the final research report requirement for the solicitation is posted on NIJ's webpage.

Required Data Sets and Associated Files and Documentation. Any recipient of an award under this solicitation will be expected to submit to the National Archive of Criminal Justice Data (NACJD) all data sets that result in whole or in part from the work funded by the award, along with associated files and any documentation necessary for future efforts by others to reproduce the project's findings and/or to extend the scientific value of the data set through secondary analysis.

In addition to these deliverables (and the required reports and data on performance measures), NIJ expects scholarly products to result from each award under this solicitation, taking the form of one or more published, peer-reviewed, scientific journal articles, and/or (if appropriate) law review journal articles, book chapter(s) or book(s) in the academic press, technological prototypes, patented inventions, or similar scientific products. NIJ expects that there will be an equal effort to make the research findings accessible to practitioner and policymaker audiences.

The Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables are directly related to the performance measures that demonstrate the results of the work completed, as discussed under Application and Submission Information.

OJP Policy Priority Areas

In FY 2021 and in addition to executing any program-specific prioritization that may be applicable, OJP will give priority consideration to applications as follows:

- Applications that address specific challenges that rural communities face.
- Applications that demonstrate that the individuals who are intended to benefit from the requested grant reside in high-poverty areas or persistent-poverty counties.
- Applications that offer enhancements to public safety in economically distressed communities (Qualified Opportunity Zones).

To receive priority consideration under the rural priority, applicants must describe what makes the geographic service area rural (using U.S. Census or other appropriate government data; for assistance, applicants may wish to refer to https://www.census.gov/programs-

surveys/geography/guidance/geo-areas/urban-rural.html), how isolated the area is from needed services, and how they will address specific challenges in rural communities.

To receive priority consideration under the poverty priority, the applicant must provide information to demonstrate that the individuals who are intended to benefit from the requested grant reside in high-poverty areas or persistent poverty counties. For purposes of this priority consideration, the term "high-poverty area" means any census tract with a poverty rate of at least 20 percent as measured by the 2013–2017 5-year data series available from the American Community Survey of the Census Bureau (applicants may search by census tract at https://www.census.gov/acs/www/data/data-tables-and-tools/narrative-profiles/2017/) and the term "persistent poverty counties" means any county that has had 20 percent or more of its population living in poverty over the past 30 years, as measured by the 1990 and 2000 decennial censuses and the most recent Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (applicants may search by county at https://www.census.gov/data/tables/time-series/dec/census-poverty.html and at https://www.census.gov/programs-surveys/saipe.html).

To receive priority consideration under the Qualified Opportunity Zones priority, applicants must include information that specifies how the project will enhance public safety in the specified QOZs. For resources on QOZs, and for a current list of designated QOZs, see the U.S. Department of the Treasury's resource webpage, accessible at https://www.cdfifund.gov/pages/opportunity-zones.aspx

OJP policy priority consideration will consist of receiving additional points in the application scoring process. NIJ will consider, among other factors, NIJ's strategic priorities, a recipient's overall management of the award, and progress of award funded work, when making continuation award decisions.

It is not uncommon for multiple problems to exist simultaneously (for example, there may be a criminal justice problem affecting public safety, a current technical challenge/need identified by forensic practitioners, as well as a scientific/technology gap between the current state of the art and a desired solution) and applicants should discuss each of these clearly and justify the importance of the separate issues. As part of this discussion, applicants should present a review of previous literature and discuss previous research related to these problems.

2. Project Design and Implementation.

Applicants should provide a detailed description of the strategies to implement this research project and address the research questions. Design elements should follow directly from the research project's goals and objectives and address the program-specific information noted in the solicitation. Applicants should describe the research methodology and analysis plan in detail and demonstrate the validity and usefulness of the data they will collect. Applicants should consider the rigor and soundness of the methodology and analytical and technical approaches for the proposed research and address the feasibility of the proposed project and potential challenges or problems in carrying out the activities.

3. Potential Impact.

Applicants should describe the potential impact of the research and how it may inform or improve criminal or juvenile justice-related policy, practice, or theory in the United States. The applicant should include a discussion of the proposed dissemination plan to produce scholarly products and to make information available to broader interested audiences, such as criminal justice practitioners or policymakers.

4. Capabilities and Competencies.

This section should describe the experience and capability of the applicant organization, key staff, and any proposed subgrantees (including consultants) that the applicant will use to implement and manage this effort and the federal funds under this award, highlighting any previous experience implementing projects of similar scope, design, and magnitude. Applicants should address:

- Experience and capacity to work with the proposed data sources in the conduct of similar research efforts.
- Experience and capacity to design and implement rigorous research and data analysis projects.
- Experience producing and disseminating meaningful deliverables.

Applicants should also outline the management plan and organization that connects to the goals and objectives of the project.

- 3. Capabilities and Competencies (capabilities, demonstrated productivity, and experience of the applicant organization and proposed project staff) (15%)
