# **National Institute of Justice (NIJ)**

#### Who we are

 NIJ is the research, development, and evaluation agency of the U.S. Department of Justice

#### **Our mission**

Improving knowledge and understanding of crime and justice issues through science



# **National Institute of Justice (NIJ)**

- Provides objective and independent knowledge and tools to inform criminal and juvenile justice decision-making
- Has two research offices:
  - Office of Research, Evaluation, and Technology
  - Office of Investigative and Forensic Sciences
- Administers the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs)
- Hosts CrimeSolutions, a repository of evaluation evidence



# NIJ W.E.B. Du Bois Program

- Begun in Fiscal Year (FY) 2000
- Supports quantitative and qualitative research that advances knowledge regarding intersections of race, crime, violence, and administration of justice within the United States





- Expanded funding opportunity in FY 2016 to include Scholars along with Fellows
- Reinstituted in FY 2021 with a specific focus on reducing racial and ethnic disparities within justice systems



# NIJ W.E.B. Du Bois Program

- Over 40 Scholars and Fellows
  - Relatively modest but impactful program ~ \$6 million investment
- Projects include:
  - Implicit Racial Bias, Community Context, and Perceptions of Crime and Justice
  - Police Officer Learning, Mentoring, and Racial Bias in Traffic Stops
  - Improving the Accuracy and Fairness of Pretrial Release Decisions
  - Examining Race and Gender Disparities in Restricted Housing Placements



## NIJ Requirements for FY 2021 W.E.B. Du Bois Solicitation

### **Applicants must:**

- Propose research on public policy interventions that may reduce racial and ethnic disparities in the justice system
- Submit proposals under two categories of researchers:
  - W.E.B. Du Bois Scholars Researchers who are advanced in their careers (awarded a terminal degree at least seven years prior to December 31, 2021). Scholars applications must include a mentorship component
  - ➤ W.E.B. Du Bois Fellows Researchers who are early in their careers (awarded a terminal degree within seven years of December 31, 2021)



## NIJ Requirements for FY 2021 W.E.B. Du Bois Solicitation

## Applicants must provide as applicable:

- A complete description of the data to be used in the research
- A description of the justice phenomenon that currently results in an unwarranted disparity in the treatment of, or outcomes for, racial or ethnic categories
- A disparity analysis (using existing data) showing evidence of a racial or ethnic disparity surrounding the justice phenomenon or event to be studied



## NIJ Requirements for FY 2021 W.E.B. Du Bois Solicitation

## **Applicants must provide as applicable:**

- A detailed description of the modification or intervention expected to resolve the unwarranted disparity, and a summary of the literature that suggests the intervention will reduce the unwarranted disparity
- A description of the analytic techniques to be employed and methods of determining success/failure
- An explicit statement discussing how the proposed research follows the W.E.B. Du Bois Program's tradition of multidisciplinary scientific inquiry, and how it will propel the justice research field forward



# **Application Critical Elements**

# **Basic Minimum Requirements (BMR):**

- Proposal narrative
- Budget worksheet & budget narrative
- Resumes/CVs for key personnel
  - Principal investigator(s)
  - Any and all co-principal investigators



# **Application Evaluation Criteria**

- Statement of the Problem and Research Questions (15%)
- Project Design and Implementation (50%)
- Capabilities and Competencies (20%)
- Potential Impact (15%)

#### Other non-scored criteria:

- Dissemination Plan
- Budget



## **External and Internal Review**

#### **BMR/Responsiveness Review**

- Submitted by an eligible applicant
- Responsive to the scope of the solicitation
- Critical elements included

#### **External Peer Review**

Technical and practitioner reviewers

#### **Internal Review**

- NIJ scientific staff and senior management
- Department subject matter experts as relevant

All funding decisions are at the discretion of the NIJ director



## **Other Considerations**

## **Qualities of Successful Proposals:**

- Include a rigorous research design
- Provide relevant literature
- Clearly articulate research questions
- Incorporate hypotheses as appropriate
- Describe data that will be used for the research



## **Other Considerations**

## **Qualities of Successful Proposals:**

- Clearly show which data will be used for which measures
- Explain how measures will answer proposed questions
- Discuss the relevance of the study
- Free of grammatical and typographical errors



# **Application Process**

Applications will be submitted in a new two-step process, each with its own deadline:

December 30, 2021 @ 11:59 PM EST

Step 1: Applicants submit SF-424 and SF-LLL in Grants gov

January 13, 2022 @ 11:59 PM EST

 Step 2: Applicants submit full application, including attachments, in <u>JusticeGrants.usdoj.gov</u>

\*Read the solicitation document carefully for further guidance.
