

## **Motivation and goal**

- Consistent, rigorous measurement of community perceptions provides critical feedback to police, city managers, and community members
- Probability surveys difficult and expensive
- Nonprobability surveys difficult to establish representativeness
- Using existing data to develop proxy measures is a potential alternative approach

#### Goal:

 Develop knowledge leading to more accurate measurement of community perceptions of policing and public safety.



## Required characteristics of proposed methods

- Representative
- Cost effective
- Accurate across microgeographies
- Allow frequent assessment
- Scalable for use in jurisdictions of various sizes





#### Structure of the solicitation

- Topic 1: Survey methods
  - Develop, pilot, and evaluate proposed innovative method or analysis
- Topic 2: Use of existing data
  - Develop, pilot, and evaluate new method to create direct or proxy measures from existing data



## **Topic 1: Survey methods**

- All proposals must use established question sets/survey instruments
  - For example: Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) Local-Area Crime Survey (LACS) or redesigned NCVS instrument

#### Examples of responsive proposals

- Develop new approaches or adapt approaches from other fields
- Create new methods or analyses with the goal of generating representative estimates
- Pair the BJS Local-Area Crime Survey instrument with new methods
- Use technology solutions to 1) improve survey administration techniques, or 2) support new sampling strategies, more complete sampling frames, or increase survey response rates.

#### Successful proposals

- Include the deployment of the instrument and testing to quantify the representativeness achieved
- Are not exclusively qualitative
- Are encouraged to include community engagement



## **Topic 2: Existing data**

- All proposals must develop and pilot new methods that
  - Accurately measure key constructs across microgeographies
  - Are cost effective and scalable
  - Are capable of frequent implementation
- NIJ is particularly interested in proposals that
  - Identify novel data sources that accurately represent community perceptions
  - Develop methods and technologies for processing data to enable application of new forms of data mining.
- Applicant should
  - Discuss potential harms and risks to individuals from the use of existing data
  - Provide a plan to mitigate such risk



## **Expected deliverables**

- Standard grant reporting requirements
- Final Research Report
- Data sets, associated files, and documentation
- Scholarly products





## **Key application submission requirements**

#### **Critical Application Elements (Basic Minimum Requirements)**

- Forms: SF-424 and SF-LLL (in Grants.gov)
- Program Narrative
- Budget Web-Based Form (budget details and narrative)
- Financial Management and System of Internal Control Questionnaire (in JustGrants)
- Curriculum vitae or resume for key personnel

#### **Additional Requirements**

 e.g., Project Abstract; Letters of Support; Any tools/instruments, questionnaires, tables/charts/graphs, maps; Goals, Objectives, Deliverables, and Timeline

Submit SF-424 and SF-LLL forms ONLY

May 2, 2024 at 11:59 p.m. ET

2. JustGrants.gov (<a href="https://justicegrants.usdoj.gov/getting-started">https://justicegrants.usdoj.gov/getting-started</a>)

Submit FULL application, including ALL attachments

May 16, 2024 at 8:59 p.m. ET

## **Application review process**

- Basic Minimum Review (BMR) Determination
- External Peer Review (p. 30)
  - Technical and Practitioner Reviewers
- Internal Review
  - NIJ science staff, NIJ leadership, other federal subject matter experts
- All funding decisions are made at the discretion of the NIJ Director
  - For insights see her Dear Colleague Letter

## Common peer review critiques

- Statement of the Problem (10%)
  - Fails to identify gaps in the current literature or understanding of current research
  - Literature review is insufficient
  - Scope of the proposed research is extremely limited or too ambitious
- Project Design and Implementation (45%)
  - Overall strategy is not well articulated
  - Design/methods approach does not logically flow/unclear
  - Proposed sample size is not supported by a power analysis
  - Project is not feasible



## Common peer review critiques

- Capabilities and Competencies (20%)
  - Proposed staff does not demonstrate familiarity or proficiency with the proposed methods
  - Project team does not include necessary and appropriate subject matter experts
- Potential Impact (20%)
  - Dissemination plan lacks specificity and/or is not innovative
  - No plan for reaching non-academic audiences
- Budget (5%)
  - Insufficient budget or staff time for proposed activities
  - Staff duties are not well articulated



## **Tips**

#### **Proposals should be:**

- Well-written
- Innovative
- Timely
- Rigorous and well-designed
- Feasible
- Impactful
- Include Letters of Support
- Consider research/evaluation independence



### **FAQs**

- Award amount + period of performance
- Timing of award and non-award notifications
- Foreign entities / subrecipients / co-investigators
- Filling and submitting forms / IRB / HSP / New Investigator
